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## CONTEST INTRODUCTION

Assess the competitor's skills and abilities performing various installation tasks in the field of residential, commercial, and industrial electrical wiring.

Given a supply of electrical equipment, competitors will build a complete electrical system according to supplied drawings and specifications incorporating a variety of wiring types and methods that may include non-metallic sheathed cable (NMSC), armored cable (AC90), EMT, Wireway and PVC. Competitors will demonstrate their ability to do work in accordance with drawings and specifications, while showing general understanding of basic electrical circuits and knowledge of the current CEC (Canadian Electrical Code).

## SKILLS AND KNOWLEDGE TO BE TESTED:

Throughout the competition, competitors can expect to be evaluated in the following areas:

- Installing residential wiring, commercial wiring, and control systems.
- Installing motor controls.
- Troubleshoot using test instruments.
- Wire and program a smart relay.
- The provided smart relay must be programmed by the onboard display.

## PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Competitors will work in a 3-sided booth installing materials as described in the Contest Introduction. The project diagram will be provided on site. Please see the attached Test Project that has been released to assist with training prior to the Provincial Skills Canada Competition.

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## TIE BREAKING PROCESS:

In the event of a tie between two or more competitors, the competitor with the highest mark in Operation will be declared the overall winner. If still tied, the competitor with the highest mark in Health, Safety and Housekeeping will be declared the overall winner. And, if still tied, the competitor who took the least amount of time to complete the project will be declared the overall winner.

## CLOTHING REQUIREMENT

Appropriate work clothing must be worn to compete. All clothing must be neat, clean and free of rips and tears. Casual wear such as shorts and open toe footwear will not be permitted. No loose-fitting clothes or jewelry.

## SAFETY

The health, safety, and welfare of all individuals involved with Skills Canada Alberta are of vital importance. Safety is a condition of participation with Skills Canada Alberta and shall not be sacrificed for the sake of expediency. At the discretion of the judges and technical committees, any competitor can be denied the right to participate should they not have the required proper safety equipment and/or act in an unsafe manner that can cause harm to themselves or others.

If a gold medalist is not able to attend the SCNC, the next top-ranking individual will be asked to participate.
