## **Volunteers**

Volunteers are the driving force behind all Skills Canada Alberta activities. Each year more than 750 Provincial Technical Committee (PTC) members, judges, mentors and Try-A-Trade® volunteers share their expertise and time with youth in order to inspire them to pursue rewarding education and career opportunities.

In place of our usual in-person PTC planning meetings in Red Deer, individual meetings were held virtually for each one of our 46 committees. These meetings were used to plan our virtual Regional & Provincial Skills Canada Competitions. Volunteers form the nature of the contest, the areas of knowledge and skill to be tested, and source the tools, materials and equipment required to host the competition. The competitions could not happen without them.

#### **Volunteer of the Year**

Ian Campbell has been an active member of the Culinary Arts Provincial Technical Committee (PTC) for nearly 20 years. During that time he has acted as PTC Chair for many years, and represented Alberta on the National Technical Committee.

During his time as Chair, Ian was a model leader for his fellow members, working to strengthen the committee. Ian has also played a crucial role in the Edmonton Regional Culinary Competition since it's inception, and has worked with other committee members to create training resources for students and teachers. As an instructor at NAIT, Ian has worked to train many Post-Secondary students competing in Culinary, including several provincial and national medalists. Providing mentorship to young chefs is important to Ian, and he plays an active role in assisting with their careers even after they graduate from their program.



## Skills in the Classroom

On an average year, the Skills Canada Alberta team travels across Alberta, visiting schools to share information on education and career opportunities in the trades and technologies. This year we developed a virtual Skills in the Classroom program that could be delivered to any school across the province safely. The program was developed in the form of a toolkit spanning the "7 Dimensions of Wellbeing". The goals of this toolkit included:

- » Encouraging students to think beyond the classroom, getting them excited about their future by caring for themselves today.
- » Arming students with the tools to go from coping to thriving during the pandemic and in other challenging scenarios they'll encounter in their future.
- » Providing students with the self-awareness and understanding they need to make career choices that unlock their passion and ignite their potential.
- » Exposing students to SCA programming, which offers opportunities for students to grow their core skill sets, explore work experience and develop their personal and professional networks.

Despite the challenge of not being able to deliver in-person presentations, enthusiasm for Skills in the Classroom remained strong.

- » 2815 students and 74 teachers were reached through 57 presentations in the 2020/2021 season.
- » Skills Canada Alberta was an exhibitor and presenter at many virtual Teacher Conventions, CTS events and career showcases

#### Skills in the Classroom survey findings:

100%

of teachers surveyed believed the presentations equipped their students with the knowledge and skills for personalized and meaningful career exploration.

95.7%

of students found the information in the presentation to be valuable

When asked what the highlight of the presentation was, students shared responses like:

- » The idea of how we can go into a course that interests US. We can choose based on our personalities and dream jobs."
- "Learning about passions and that pursuing your passion is good for your mental health."
- "For me it was hearing about all these events that you can take part of based on your interests also loved hearing about the cardboard boat challenge."




# Try-A-Trade<sup>®</sup> Takeout

In partnership with various industry and education leaders, SCA offered a brand new Try-A-Trade® Takeout program. Teachers were able to order kits for different activities, giving students the chance to test-drive careers and learn new skills from their own classrooms. Each kit included all necessary materials to complete the activity, as well as instructions and tutorial videos where needed.

In addition, SCA partnered with Pembina and Inter Pipeline to provide Try-A-Trade® Takeout activities to specific regions and Indigenous communities.

- » 34 activities representing 24 different trade and technology areas were developed.
- » 9217 students from 117 schools were reached with the activities.









# **Cardboard Chariot Races**

Replacing our usual Cardboard Boat Race, SCA launched our first ever Cardboard Chariot Race.

Armed with cardboard, duct tape and a few other odds and ends, junior and senior high students from across Alberta used their skills and ingenuity to transform these materials into a pullable chariot to carry one passenger.

Students worked in teams to construct a chariot with only the supplied materials, and raced teams from other schools via Webex. This challenge is open-ended and problem-solving in nature. It involves design, research, and presentation. Students are introduced to concepts such as principles of structure, strength rigidity and direction control.





# **Skills Exploration Days**

Skills Exploration Days is a junior high program designed to complement and support Alberta Education's Career and Technology Foundations (CTF) Program of Studies. This program provides an opportunity for teachers and students (grade 7-9) to participate in an authentic and meaningful skilled trade and technology career exploration experience. Through Skills Exploration Days, SCA introduces students to careers in the trades and technologies at a younger age, before they start to make education and career decisions.

At Skills Exploration Days, design thinking activities and hands-on building projects give students the opportunity to explore their skills in an engaging and immersive day of learning. Students work in groups to address a problem that is relevant to their communities by designing and building a prototype. The goal is to encourage the use of empathy through design thinking, inquiry, and experiential learning.

Skills Exploration Days was hosted virtually on November 24 & 25, 2021. Students completed the same design thinking activities and worked together as teams in their own schools to build a prototype.

In total 980 students took part in one of the two days.

All registered schools received a toolkit valued at \$4000 in order to enhance their CTF programs.

# SkillsXibition presented by Syncrude

SkillsXibition was launched as a replacement for field trips to Skill City at the Provincial Skills Canada Competition. The goal of SkillsXibition was to bring a skill and career exploration experience to students within the safety of their own schools. 15 pre-recorded demonstrations were released online in areas that included woodworking, culinary arts, photography, public speaking and more!

Each session included a creative and hands-on activity that students could follow along with. Industry expert personalities lead each session, and all required materials were sent to registered schools.

More than 1600 students from 31 schools across the province registered for SkillsXibition.

## **GETT**

The Girls Exploring Trades and Technologies (GETT) program is an excellent opportunity for the young women in schools across Alberta to discover that the trades are open to everyone. The day breaks down stereotypes and gives high school girls hands-on experiences with many trade and technology career options.

Participants are able to connect with certified tradeswomen, apprentices and technology experts that have pursued non-traditional careers. Their stories, experiences and knowledge broaden the participants' perspective on their own career opportunities, encouraging them to think big!

The 2021 GETT program was held concurrently with SkillsXibition, with various sessions being geared towards young women and hosted by female industry leaders. Represented areas included carpentry, baking, graphic design and more. In addition to the sessions, students who registered for GETT received exclusive content and access to networking virtually with female industry influencers on our GETT Padlet.

# Regional and Qualifying Skills Canada Competitions

SCA is thankful to the technical institutes, regional career development organizations and high schools that host and support our 9 Regional Skills Canada Competitions (RSCC).

Due to the restrictions placed on events in response to Covid-19, all Regional Skills Canada Competitions were hosted virtually. Competitors from all 9 regions competed at the same time from their own schools in their selected contest areas. The top placements from each unique region were still awarded a place to compete at the 2021 Provincial Skills Canada Competition. 346 high school students took part in these regional competitions in the hosted contest areas:

SCA usually hosts an additional 2 online Qualifying Skills Canada Competitions (QSCC) in Graphic Design & Photography, allowing students to make online submissions in order to qualify for the Provincial Skills Canada Competition (PSCC). As all competitions were hosted virtually this year, the 2021 QSCC's were combined with the PSCC.

# 29<sup>th</sup> Annual Provincial Skills Canada Competition

The philosophy of the Provincial Skills Canada Competition (PSCC) is to reward students for excellence, to directly involve industry in evaluating student performance and to keep training relevant to employers' needs.

During the competition, secondary and post-secondary students compete in one of 45 contest areas, and work on a project that has been designed by experts in that field. Many gold medalists at the PSCC are rewarded with an appointment to Team Alberta and an opportunity to showcase their talents at the Skills Canada National Competition, with further opportunity to progress to a WorldSkills Competition.

Due to the restrictions placed on large events in response to the Covid-19 pandemic, the 2021 Provincial Skills Canada Competition was hosted virtually and at various post-secondary institutes. Hosting the competition virtually allowed students to stay connected to a Skills community that values and drives vocational education, within the safety of their own schools, institutes, and homes.

In total Team Alberta received medals in 41 of the 45 contest areas we participated in.





# WorldSkills Provincial Champion Scholarship

Skills Canada Alberta is committed to inspiring students, developing their talents and elevating the skill level of trades and technologies in Alberta. Each year at the Provincial Skills Canada Competition, we award three scholarships of \$1200 each to the two highest ranking grade 12 medalists and the top ranking post-secondary competitor in each contest area. In total \$86,400 in scholarships were awarded to 52 high school students and 20 post-secondary students.
