AWARDS CEREMONY INFORMATION:

The awards ceremony will be held at 4:00 p.m. in the Swing Room (AN1804). It is open to the public, and parents are encouraged to attend.

CONTEST INTRODUCTION

To assess the contestant's ability in sewing construction related to the field of fashion technology.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

- Competitors will choose their own pattern for the competition. Pattern choices need to be submitted to the committee by no later than March 1 for their approval prior to the competition. Competitors are encouraged to submit their pattern as soon as it has been selected/created.
 - Email pattern selection to office@careersteps.ca for approval. Approvals will be completed within 2 business days. Those not approved will have reasoning included.
- Patterns/designs chosen by the students may be either a store-bought pattern or one drafted by the participant as long as it meets the following criteria:
 - Is able to be sewn during the allotted competition time
 - Is a top/shirt that has sleeves, a closure, and one additional design feature (ex. colour blocking, ruffles, decorative elements, etc.)
 - Is a design that will highlight the participant's skill level
- Competitors should arrive with pattern pinned and ready to cut on the morning of the contest. Competitors will be given time to layout their pattern so that it can be judged prior to the competition start time. **DO NOT** cut prior to the contest.
- The **Garment Information Sheet** (see attached) must accompany your pattern layout on the morning of the competition. Please **staple a 2 inch by 2 inch swatch of the fabric** you are using to the Garment Information Sheet.





- A fashion illustration or technical drawing must accompany your pattern layout on the morning of
 the competition. The illustration/technical drawing must clearly show all the construction details of
 the garment (seams, topstitching, closures, decorative elements, etc.) and can be drawn using the
 croquis found at https://skillsalberta.com/wp-content/uploads/2022/10/PSCC-Watermark.pdf, if
 desired. The illustration/technical drawing will not be judged but will give the judges a clear vision
 of your chosen design that will assist in the process.
- Students are encouraged to sew a practice garment at home or school, in order to establish assembly techniques and timelines for completion.
- Competition support will be available in the room throughout the contest. Competition support
 may be approached with questions about machine issues but should not be relied upon to provide
 garment construction support.
 - Supervisors for these competitors are expected to remain on the Lethbridge College campus and be prepared to help with any equipment malfunctions if necessary.
- It is recommended that competitors label all equipment. Career Transitions and/or Lethbridge College are not responsible for any equipment.
- Visitors (including friends, family members, classmates, and teachers, etc.) will not be allowed to
 enter competition rooms without permission from the Competition Support in the room.
 Communication with competitors could result in points being deducted from the competitor's final
 score.

EQUIPMENT AND MATERIALS COMPETITORS MUST SUPPLY:

- Pattern of competitor's choice vetted per above
- Sewing machine, needles, thread, and bobbins
- Serger
- Iron and ironing board with cover; water if necessary
- A power bar and/or extension cord is required
- Fabric
 - price of fabric is NOT to exceed \$30.00 per meter
 - fabric choice is a main fabric
- Each competitor will be reimbursed \$55.00 to help offset the cost of pattern, fabric and notions used for the competition and preparation
- Equipment and supplies needed to construct garment (e.g.: tape measure, pins, scissors, marking equipment, etc.)
- Appropriate hanger to display your garment
- Please label all personal equipment
- Optional: Sealed water bottle (must not be able to spill). NO other beverages are allowed. NO food is allowed.

EQUIPMENT AND MATERIALS SUPPLIED BY THE COMMITTEE:

- A station for each competitor including:
 - a 3 ft. by 6 ft. table
 - chair
 - electrical outlet (students must bring their own extension cords and/or power bar as not all electrical outlets are directly beside the students' table)



JUDGING CRITERIA

Competitors will be judged on:

- Pattern layout
- Garment information sheet
- Construction stitches
- Construction seams
- Construction sleeves
- Construction closure
- Construction design feature
- Finishing pressing
- Finishing presentation
- Level of difficulty*

See attached judging sheet for further detail.

* Participants are encouraged to attempt something that will challenge their abilities vs something that is too easy for their skill level. The committee would rather see a competitor attempt something a little bit harder and have some minor issues with it than to perfectly sew something below their skill level.

CLOTHING REQUIREMENT

It is important that competitors present a professional image and appearance:

- Appropriate work clothing must be worn to compete including no open-toed shoes, no cloth or
 knit shoes. All clothing must be neat and clean and free of rips and tears. Casual wear such as
 shorts will not be permitted. No loose-fitting clothes or jewelry.
- Cell phones are not allowed in the competition area.
- Students who wish to listen to music while they work will be allowed to bring in headphones and iPods, mP3 players, etc. as long as the device does not have internet browsing capabilities. Competition assistants may ask to see the device to ensure it complies with requirements.

SAFETY

The health, safety and welfare of all individuals involved with Skills Canada Alberta are of vital importance. Safety is a condition of participation with Skills Canada Alberta and shall not be sacrificed for the sake of expediency. At the discretion of the judges and technical committees, any competitor can be denied the right to participate should they not have the required proper safety equipment and/or act in an unsafe manner that can cause harm to themselves or others.
