GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Purpose of the Challenge:

Candidates will manipulate the block for an oversized unisex coat, including a two-piece collar/collar stand, button closure, and set-in sleeves

Skills and Knowledge to be Tested:

The contest will focus on practical work. Theoretical knowledge is limited to what is necessary to carry out the practical work. Candidates will manipulate the block for a lined jacket with a collar and lapel, and set-in sleeves to include required design elements (see below) and construct a jacket.

Duration of the Contest: 13 hours

• When planning the design details, candidates should consider the time frame of the competition. The entire jacket must be completed within 13 hours.



PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Tasks to be performed before the competition:

- Competitor must prepare and bring a color fashion illustration of their proposed design (minimum 8 ½" X 11", maximum 11" X 17") suitable for display. Points will be deducted if this is not available at the beginning of the competition. Do not mount your illustrations. Fashion illustration will not be judged.
- Competitor must also use the watermark croquis, provided on the Skills Alberta website, to complete a front and back technical on one page. It is intended that the drawings be completed directly on the watermark croquis. The technical drawing must be completed in pencil and must include a collar and lapel, a visible functional front closure, and set in sleeve, as per the basic jacket block. Design Details one and two must be clearly identified. Points will be deducted if the technical drawing is not submitted prior to orientation.

Tasks to be performed during the competition:

Candidates will complete a unisex jacket with a collar and set in sleeves.

• Industry sewing standards for garment construction to be maintained as equipment allows.

Competitors will begin by creating the pattern for their design, using the basic Jacket pattern provided by the committee. Note that patterns will not be submitted for judging.

- Design components (level of difficulty and execution) will be considered when judging and must include a minimum of the following:
 - Fabric will be provided for exterior and lining. Lining fabric must only be used for the interior of the garment.
 - Design must incorporate the transfer or conversion of ALL darts.
 - Design must include two symmetrical welt pockets of choice on the outside of the Jacket. Minimum 4.5 inch openings, welt height minimum 3/8 inch
 - Competitors must incorporate at least one vent. However, additional vents/slits may be included as Design detail #1. If the mandatory vent is placed on the sleeve, they will not be included as part of the sleeve evaluation.
 - Competitors must include a minimum of two of the following design components: yoke, overlay, design lines, vent(s), tabs, epaulettes, belt, added fullness, extra pockets, etc.
 - Appropriate hem treatment must be incorporated
- Competitors must **NOT** alter the following mandatory components of the jacket block and the final construction must reflect the dimensions of the pattern:
 - Sleeve Cap (NO pattern modification to the sleeve cap)
 - o Armhole shape
 - o Shoulder length





- Two-piece collar/collar stand and lapel
- o Neckline
- ⊖ Button and French buttonholes
- Button and French buttonholes 'placement' (length can be adjusted for the button size provided)
- The length of the coat must finish a minimum of 1m. at center back
- At the end of Day 1, competitors must submit their pocket pattern and Vent pattern pieces and constructed pockets & Vent for evaluation. Points will not be allotted for components that are incomplete by the required time.
- As part of the evaluation, the following aspects will be considered:
 - The degree of difficulty and quality of the garment construction.
 - The fit and wearability of the jacket.
 - The overall appearance of the jacket and the conformity of the design to the technical drawing.

Only completed Jackets that adhere to the requirements outlined may qualify to be awarded a Skills Canada Alberta medal.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIALS

Equipment and Materials Competitors Must Supply:

- Pattern drafting tools
- Sewing construction tools
- Cutting tools rotary cutters* must be accompanied with protective shield or glove and mats are permitted
- Pressing tools i.e. iron, ham, sleeve board, press cloth, seam roll, etc.
- The following items are not permitted: books, written notes, diagrams, paper, scrap fabric, embellishing materials, sewing machine attachments, 2-way electronic devices.

Please note:

- Ironing boards are not required. Pressing stations will be available within the competition area.
- Toolboxes will be assessed at the beginning of the competition to ensure no specialty tools are brought into the site.

Equipment and Materials Supplied by Skills Canada Alberta:

- 4 m medium weight woven twill fabric medium weight knit in houndstooth design
- 3.5 m 2 m x 90" wide lining
- 2.5 m interfacing
- Pattern paper
- Shoulder pads mandatory





- 3.5 cm 2.5 cm Buttons 2 Mandatory, 6 optional (8 total available per competitor)
 - NOTE: The pattern will not be changed due to the button size change, competitors can reduce the length of buttonhole accordingly.
- Thread
- Block for jacket with collar and lapel and set in sleeves includes 1 cm seam allowances. Pattern pieces:
 - o Jacket front
 - Jacket back
 - Upper collar
 - o Under collar
 - o Top Sleeve
 - o Under Sleeve
- Domestic sewing machine with a regular sewing foot, zipper foot
- Central Ironing Station
- 2 Dress forms size 4 (shared by competitors) * competitors may bring their own

SAFETY

The health, safety and welfare of all individuals involved with Skills Canada Alberta are of vital importance. Safety is a condition of participation with Skills Canada Alberta and shall not be sacrificed for the sake of expediency. At the discretion of the judges and technical committees, any competitor can be denied the right to participate should they not have the required proper safety equipment and/or act in an unsafe manner that can cause harm to themselves or others.

Required Clothing (provided by competitor)

- Flat, soft soled shoes with closed toes sneakers are acceptable
- Long hair must be tied back
- Dangling jewelry not permitted
- Long, flowing sleeves not permitted

TIE BREAKING PROCESS

In the event of a tie, the winner will be determined by:

- In the event of a tie, the competitor with the highest combined score for the "Collar" and "Sleeve" criteria will be declared the winner.
- Tiebreaker #2: If a tie still remains, the competitor with the highest score in the "Vent/Slit" criteria will be declared the winner.
- Tiebreaker #3: If a third tie occur, the competitor with the highest score in the "Design Detail #1" will be declared the winner.
