What was the first thing that went through your mind when you realized you had made Team Canada?

Do you have any words of encouragement for future Skills competitors?

"Pick a skill you actually enjoy. It sounds (and is) cliché, but the grind is so much easier when you like what you're doing.

When you genuinely care, you'll be able to push through long practice hours, setbacks, and pressure. I'd say focus on learning first, and then winning, because the skills you build will outlast the competition. I know that's kind of generic advice, but at least in my experience it's been true."

What do you love most about your trade/technology?

"Web development is such a huge umbrella, so there's lots of room to explore different paths within it. That means I can have a bunch of other interests but still pursue web development at the same time. It's great! I can build websites I want to build, and call it my training. I'll likely do some actual focused training, of course, but I don't need to do as much."

What has been the best part of your Skills journey so far?

"During my second year at provincials, I became quick friends with a competitor from Saskatchewan. He won that year, and I celebrated with him. When I won this year, he was watching the livestream and cheering me on the whole time. Knowing he was rooting for me the same way I did for him really stuck with me. That kind of support makes the competition feel like more than just results, because it's also about creating these friendships and being part of a community that lasts long after the event."
